### *Rosemary Verey: Queen of Horticulture*

During a sabbatical from law firm Debevoise & Plimpton, **Barbara Paul Robinson** worked as a gardener for Rosemary Verey at Barnsley House, Gloucestershire, England. Her biography of Verey, due to be published next spring, recounts the story of the partnership between Verey and her architect-husband in creating their renowned gardens. An inspirational role model who was particularly important in America, Verey was a self-taught amateur who turned to gardening late in life. She wrote the first of 18 books at 62, became garden designer to the rich and famous, and achieved world fame.

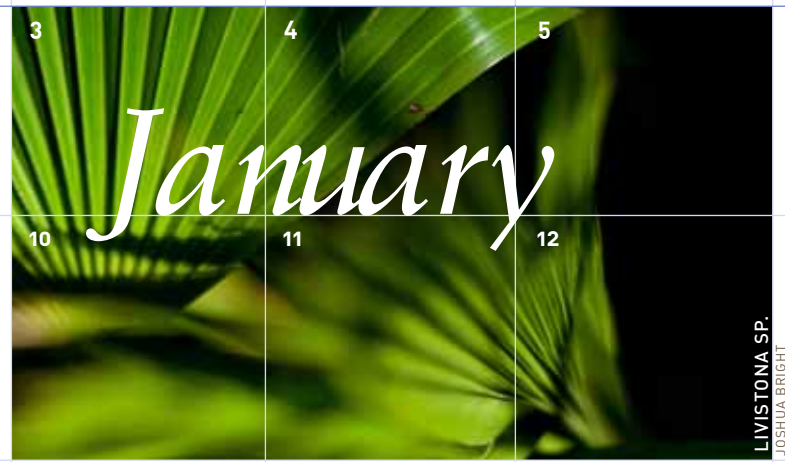

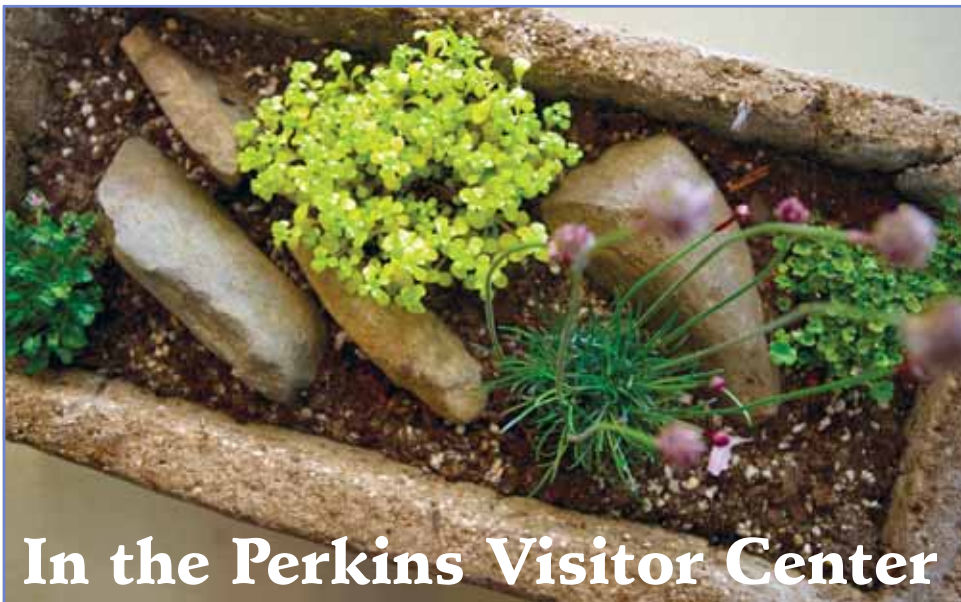


## Winter Workspace Residency Begins January 3
