## Art at the Garden

### Glyndor Gallery

#### Winter Workspace Program

JANUARY 4–MARCH 21, 2010

While Glyndor Gallery is closed this winter, it will be transformed into artist workspace for seven visual artists to develop new work or pursue a particular project using Wave Hill's exceptional garden and woodland settings as a source conducive to the creative process. With a winter focus on the Hudson River, the artists will engage with ideas about the river. The artists selected include [Susan Benarcik](#), [Liz Burow](#), [Kent Henrickson](#), [Robyn Love](#), [Rita MacDonald](#), [Eve Mosher](#) and [Anne-Katrin Spiess](#). Three artists are developing projects that will be on view at Wave Hill later in the year. [Robyn Love](#)'s *House Study/Handmade* begins with the process of dying wool, using plants native to the Hudson River area. She spins the wool into yarn, then offers skeins to the public to knit hats. The hats will, in turn, be returned to Wave Hill and displayed as part of an installation in Wave Hill house in the spring. During January and February, she will have open studio time for visitors to spin wool and knit or crochet hats.

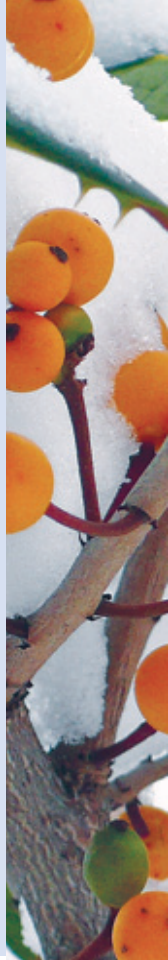

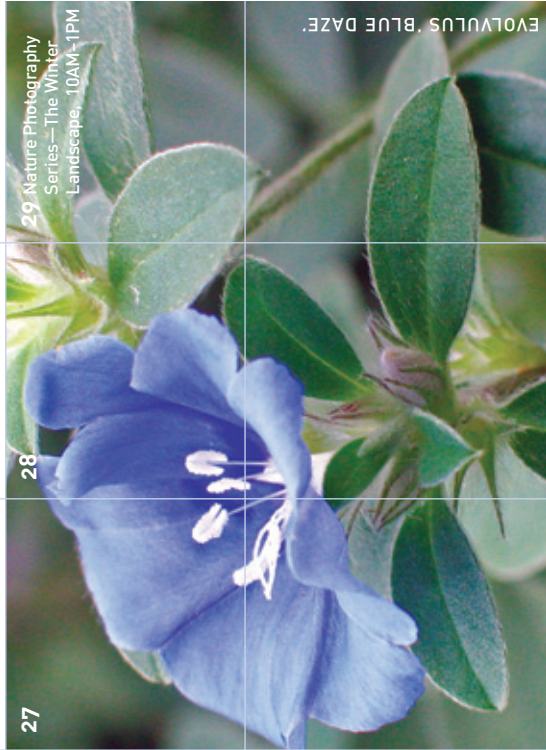
