	<p><i>Cercidiphyllum japonicum</i> (Katsua Tree) A native to China and Japan, the leaves emerge in spring as reddish purple buds and flush out into a delicate green. In autumn they turn a creamy gold and emit a peculiar, but wonderful, burnt-sugar aroma once they have dropped to the ground. Planted by Marco Polo Stufano, this tree is located on the South Lawn below Glyndor House.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Magnolia</i> 'Butterflies' (Magnolia cultivar) A truly yellow flowered magnolia, it is the result of a cross between the native cucumber magnolia (<i>M. acuminata</i>) and the Yulan magnolia (<i>M. denudata</i>) and was raised by a breeder in Michigan. Located on the South Lawn this tree was planted in 2000.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Magnolia macrophylla</i> (Large Leaved Magnolia) With leaves up to 30" long, it is not surprising this native of the southeastern US is also known as the "bigleaf" magnolia. The flowers are very large and can be nearly a foot across! Located on the South Lawn this tree was planted in 1975.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Magnolia</i> x 'Elizabeth' (Magnolia cultivar) This tree was the first of the yellow flowered magnolias to come from the breeding program at Brooklyn Botanic Garden. The flower buds start out a bright primrose fading to a lovely creamy yellow. Located on the South Lawn this tree was planted in 1977.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Nyssa sylvatica</i> (Tupelo) The tupelo (or black gum) is a beautiful native tree with outstanding fall color. This tree lights up the view each autumn with its almost luminous oranges and reds. This tree is located on the South Lawn.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Acer tegmentosum</i> 'White Tigress' (Manchu Striped Maple cultivar) This is a small tree with pronounced white striping on the bark and considered as the best of the striped bark maples for use in gardens. Located on the South Lawn this tree was planted in 1997.</p>	\$5,000

	<p><i>Acer hybrid</i> (Hybrid Maple) This small but prominent tree is a hybrid of <i>Acer griseum</i> (paper bark maple) and another, unknown maple. It has an interesting flaky bark. Located prominently on the Entrance Lawn this tree was planted in 1969.</p>	\$25,000
	<p>Magnolia Bed</p> <p><i>Magnolia stellata</i> (Star Magnolia) One of a group of magnolias that fill the "Stellata Bed" in the middle of the Entrance Lawn. The flowers are pure white and fragrant.</p> <p><i>Magnolia stellata</i> 'Rosea' (Star Magnolia cultivar) A light pink flowered form of the usually white flowered species. Also part of the "Stellata Bed".</p> <p><i>Magnolia x loebneri</i> 'Leonard Messel' (Loebner Magnolia) This cultivar is the result of a chance cross between <i>Magnolia kobus</i> and <i>Magnolia stellata</i> 'Rosea'. This occurred in the garden of Colonel Messel in Sussex, England – hence the cultivar name. The white flowers are flushed with pink and the scent is lovely.</p>	\$25,000
	<p><i>Prunus yedoensis</i> 'Akebono' (Yoshino Cherry cultivar) The cultivar name 'Akebono' means "daybreak" in Japanese. This makes perfect sense when you see the freshness of the spring blossom. Located on the Great Lawn this beautiful tree was planted in 1993.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Xanthoceras sorbifolium</i> (Yellowhorn) An unusual small tree from northern China. Almost unknown in the gardening trade, it has clusters of fragrant white flowers in the spring and these are followed by large rounded seedpods. Located on the Great Lawn near the Pergola this tree was planted in 1983.</p>	\$5,000

	<p><i>Pinus koraiensis</i> 'Morris Blue' (Korean Pine cultivar) The Korean pine is not commonly planted but is actually very hardy and has an interestingly relaxed habit compared to the stiffness of many other pines. The reason for its name is the needles of the cultivar 'Morris Blue' have a two-tone bluish appearance. This tree is located in the Viburnum Bed west of the Perkins Visitor Center.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Acer japonicum</i> 'Aconitifolium' (Full Moon Maple) A beautiful compact tree, the leaves are deeply cut and look very fern-like. The fall color is outstanding. This tree had been in the Wave Hill nursery since 1997 and was planted in 2005 near the entrance to the Perkins Visitor Center.</p>	\$5,000
	<p><i>Malus sargentii</i> 'Tina' (Crabapple cultivar) Renowned for its disease resistance, this dwarf crabapple tree is also notable for its tiny pea-like red fruits that hang on for months from fall into winter. The cultivar is a favorite of the Wave Hill garden staff and this tree was a replacement for one that was lost prior to the restoration of the Perkins Visitor Center. This tree had been in the Wave Hill nursery since 2000.</p>	\$5,000
	<p><i>Prunus subhirtella</i> 'Autumnalis Rosea' (Higan Cherry cultivar) Although the same species as the well known weeping cherry, this cultivar has a spreading, upright habit and, as part of its name suggests, will flower in the autumn (or even in the winter – during mild spells) and then will bloom again in the spring. The flowers are light pink when they first open but fade to almost white after a few days. Located west of the Perkins Visitor Center this tree was planted in 2004.</p>	\$5,000
	<p><i>Ulmus x hollandica</i> 'Jacqueline Hillier' (Dutch Elm cultivar) A dwarf elm tree with even tinier leaves. It has the appearance of a natural bonsai tree. Located west of the Perkins Visitor Center this tree was planted in 2006.</p>	\$2,500

	<p><i>Zelkova sinica</i> (Chinese Zelkova) This Chinese zelkova (<i>Zelkova sinica</i>) is smaller than the more commonly planted Japanese zelkova (<i>Z. serrata</i>). The bark is mottled gray-brown with orange and is really quite remarkable. Located on the Wave Hill East Lawn in front of the Wave Hill House this tree was planted in 1998.</p> <p>Zelkovas are members of the elm family but have some resistance to the Dutch elm disease that has killed so many elms in the last century.</p>	\$25,000

	<p><i>Cornus alternifolia 'Variegata'</i> (Pagoda Dogwood) This small tree has tiers of horizontally arranged branches and white-variegated foliage. Set against the backdrop of dark evergreens it makes a wonderful sight from the lawn in front of Wave Hill House. Located by the Shade Border this tree was planted in 1994.</p>	<p>\$10,000</p>
	<p><i>Cotinus 'Grace' & Cotinus obovatus</i> (Smokebush species and cultivar) Native to Texas and Alabama, the <i>Cotinus obovatus</i> is the American smoketree. The cultivar 'Grace' is a result of a cross between the American smoketree and the common smoketree (<i>C. coggrygia</i>) from Eurasia. Both have the characteristic smoke-like panicles of flowers in summer and superb fall foliage color. Located in front of Wave Hill House these trees were planted in 1993.</p>	<p>\$10,000</p>
	<p><i>Liquidambar styraciflua 'Gumball'</i> (Sweetgum cultivar) This tree is a curious and compact form of the normally giant sweetgum tree. The cultivar name indicates that the tree's shape resembles that of a gumball machine – doubly appropriate given that the species is a source of natural gum. It is located near the western entrance to the Shade Border.</p>	<p>\$10,000</p>
	<p><i>Pinus cembra 'Chalet'</i> (Swiss Stone Pine cultivar) This is a very compact form of the Swiss stone pine with a narrow pyramidal habit. The needles have a blue-green sheen which add to the sense of elegance. This tree was in the Wave Hill nursery since 1996 and planted on the northern edge of the property in 2007.</p>	<p>\$2,500</p>
	<p><i>Qercus muehlenbergii</i> (Chinkapin oak)</p>	<p>\$5,000</p>

	<p>White Pine Bed</p> <p><i>Pinus strobus</i> 'Nana' (White Pine cultivar) This is a compact form of the native white pine and shares a bed to the north of Armor Hall with two weeping specimens of the same species. The appearance is that of a soft green teddy bear.</p> <p><i>Pinus strobus</i> 'Pendula' (White Pine cultivar) A weeping form of the native white pine. Together with the 'Nana', they form a lovely group of pines in the island bed .</p>	\$25,000
	<p><i>Cercidiphyllum japonicum</i> 'Heronswood Globe' (Katsura Tree cultivar) This is a dense, rounded form of the katsura tree. It has the same pretty rounded leaves as the species and they turn to a wonderful yellow in the autumn – and give off a sweet burnt candy smell when they drop to the ground. Located on the Conifer Lawn near Wave Hill House this tree was planted in 1997.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Picea orientalis</i> 'Skylands' (Oriental Spruce cultivar) An elegant tree with a slender silhouette, this golden-yellow form of the oriental spruce makes a distinctive presence throughout the year. The species is native to Asia Minor and the Caucasus. Located near Wave Hill House this tree was planted in 1994.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Stewartia pseudocamellia</i> (Japanese Stewartia) Decorative all the year through, this stewartia has wonderful bark that is mottled gray and soft orange. The white flowers appear in mid summer and the autumn foliage color is second to none. Located on the Conifer Lawn this tree was planted in 1972.</p>	\$10,000
	<p><i>Pinus kwangtungensis</i> (Guangdon Pine) A very rare tree from Guangdon in southern China. It is young and growing vigorously and is developing a stately habit. The foliage (needles) are gray-green. Located on the lower part of the Conifer Lawn behind Wave Hill House this tree was planted in 1999.</p>	\$5,000
