## Wave Hill Launches 2022-2023 Concert Season October 16, 2022

Bronx, NY, September 28, 2022 — Wave Hill, a world-class public garden and cultural center in the Bronx, is pleased to announce its Fall 2022/Winter 2023 concert series, featuring a diverse soundscape and genre-defying artists. The series features two bold and virtuosic ensembles: New York-based brass quartet The Westerlies (October 16) performing selections from their latest album, Wherein Lies the Good, and the energetic Warp Trio (February 26) with a program that "exemplifies the genre-obliterating direction of contemporary classical music" (Columbia Free Times). The series is further highlighted by two outstanding pianists, the trailblazing Lara Downes (December 11) and Grammy-nominated Cuban pianist, Elio Villafranca (January 22). Rounding out the series is the dazzling jazz vocalist and Bronx native, Samara Joy (November 6) and Colombian born singer/songwriter, Alea (March 26).

## **Pianists**

Honored as 2022 Classical Woman of the Year by *Performance Today*, <u>Lara Downes</u> is a musical trailblazer and activist dedicated to expanding the resonance and relevance of American music.

In addition to appearances as a soloist with top symphony orchestras nationwide, not to mention her Billboard chart-topping albums, she is the creator and host of *AMPLIFY with Lara Downes*, a video series for NPR Music, and founder of *Rising Sun Music*, a recording series that shines light on the music and stories of Black composers over the past 200 years.

Grammy-nominated 2021 Guggenheim Fellow <u>Elio Villafranca</u> is a pianist, composer and bandleader at the forefront of his generation. Born in the Pinar del Rio province of Cuba, Villafranca fuses classical and jazz with music from the African diaspora. He has recorded and performed with jazz master artists, including Chick Correa, Paquito D'Rivera and Wynton Marsalis, who calls him "an inspired and visionary musician.

## Vocalists

Born and raised in the Bronx, rising star <u>Samara Joy</u>'s velvety, smooth voice puts her own enchanting interpretation on jazz standards from the Great American Songbook. After winning the 2019 Sarah Vaughan International Jazz Vocal Competition at the age of 19, she released her debut album *Samara Joy*. As one of America's most promising young vocalists, she has already performed in many of the great jazz venues in New York, including Jazz at Lincoln Center's Dizzy's Club Coca Cola, The Blue Note and the Apollo as well as at the New Jersey Performing Arts Center. On her latest release, *Linger Awhile*, 22-year-old Samara Joy makes her case to join the likes of Sarah, Ella, and Billie as the next jazz singing sensation recorded by the venerable Verve Records.

With a welcoming sound that embraces cumbia, vallenato, rancheras, jazz and American pop, singer-songwriter Alea moves her audiences with messages of the spirit, calls for social change and free-flowing love. Originally from La Guajira, Colombia, Alea's performance encompasses an entire generation of ethno-futuristic and folkloric music accentuated by buttery vocals, deep-rooted grooves and uplifting guitar. Alea's in-person performances are powerful encounters of the spirit, passionate travelogues that link downtown New York to a tropical Colombian cantina.

## Ensembles

"An arty quartet ... mixing ideas from jazz, new classical, and Appalachian folk" (*The New York Times*), The Westerlies is composed of childhood friends Riley Mulherkar, Chloe Rowlands, Andy Clausen and Willem de Koch. Their Wave Hill program titled *Wherein Lies the Good* is a bold and ferociously unique vision of brass, as works originally written for string quartet, solo piano, and the human voice are reinvented through their kaleidoscopic lens.

Warp Trio is an internationally touring, cross-genre chamber music experience. Reflecting the juxtaposition of Juilliard-trained musicians with members steeped in rock and jazz styles, the one-of-a-kind trio—that even has a fourth member!—can be seen performing classical works in prestigious halls on the same tour where they headline a standing room-only show at a rock venue. In addition to their electrifying public performances, they have gained a reputation for their innovative educational workshops for students from grade school through university level.
